Program A

[WMD Hazardous Materials Technician](#) (PER-261)

Course Description

The WMD Hazardous Materials Technician course is a 24-hour course that provides the responder with an overview of international and domestic terrorist threats; seminars in chemical, biological, radiological, and explosive hazards that may be used as WMD; and hands-on practical exercises utilizing the responder's knowledge and skills in identifying, detecting, categorizing, and neutralizing hazardous substances. As part of the 24 contact hours for this course, the responder performs hazardous materials technician operations at a toxic agent training facility.

Program B

[WMD Technical Emergency Response Training](#) (PER-260)

Course Description

The WMD Technical Emergency Response Training Course is a 32-hour training course providing an overview of the terrorist threat and potential targets and seminars in chemical, biological, radiological, and explosive hazards that may be used in CBRNE incidents. Participants will also experience hands-on practical exercises utilizing the responder's knowledge and skills in performing decontamination and triage procedures, using survey and monitoring equipment, and responding to an event with multiple devices. An ongoing scenario will tie all seminars and hands-on training together, providing the performance defensive responder with the ability to identify all areas of response to a CBRNE event. This course further prepares responders for a CBRNE incident by providing them the opportunity to practice their knowledge and skills in the world's only toxic chemical training facility dedicated solely to emergency responders—the Chemical, Ordnance, Biological, and Radiological Training Facility (COBRATF).

Program C

Course Description

The WMD IC: Capabilities, Planning and Response Actions course is a 24-hour course that provides the responder with in-depth training on the entire spectrum of command of a Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) terrorist event. The course provides instruction on WMD; the Incident Command System (ICS) coupled with federal response; an examination of the complexities of operational considerations and actions of command at a WMD event; pre and post planning considerations utilizing techniques which allow the commander to determine the correct composition of the planning team; evaluating the

threat to the jurisdiction; identifying and prioritizing probable targets; measuring required capabilities; and developing a local Incident Response Plan (IRP) to a WMD terrorist incident. The course culminates with the responder participating in an eight-hour real-time tabletop exercise using the materials developed in the previous sessions to plan for and command the emergency response resources at the incident site.

Program D

Course Description

The WMD Hands-On Training course is a 16-hour course that provides the responder with hands-on practical exercises that gives the responder the ability to perform triage and decontamination procedures, identify residual contamination through the use of survey and monitoring equipment, and conduct scene survey and safety. As part of the 16 contact hours for this course, the responder performs hazardous materials technician operations in a toxic agent training facility.

Program F

Course Description

The Instructor Training Certification Course is a 40-hour course that provides the responder with an overview of instruction on adult learning, task analysis, risk and hazard analysis, learning objectives and lesson plans, communication skills, instructional delivery and multimedia, testing and evaluations, and the After Action Review (ARR). The course is conducted in two phases: 11 hours of Fundamental Principles (FP) and 29 hours of Applied Principles (AP) training session. The didactic sections of the training are supported by a series of practical exercises that require the responder to perform tasks associated with that lesson.

Program G

Course Description

The WMD Emergency Medical Services course is a 24-hour course that provides the emergency medical responder with lectures, hands-on training, and practical exercises. The lectures include Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, or Explosive (CBRNE) incident management; treatment of victims of exposure to chemical hazards, biological agent infection, exposure to radiological hazards, and explosions; and interactions with hospitals and public health. Hands-on training modules provide the emergency medical responder with the knowledge and skills to perform triage operations while in Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and to perform decontamination of victims. In the Cold Lanes, the emergency medical responder will have an opportunity to practice additional

treatment protocols and transport and tracking procedures. EMS culminates on the third day with a practical exercise involving skills learned during the course.

Program H

[WMD Emergency Responder Hazardous Materials Technician](#) (PER-272)

Course Description

The WMD Emergency Responder Hazardous Materials Technician course is a 40-hour course that provides the responder with a combination of lectures and hands-on practical exercises, and training that meets requirements set by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) (*29 CFR 1910.120*) for technician level training. The ERHM course provides lectures in terrorist threat, the hazardous materials management system, responder health and safety, the Incident Command System (ICS), site management, information management, response objectives, and terminating the incident. The responder receives hands-on training in identifying hazardous materials, using surveying and monitoring equipment, selecting and using the appropriate level of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), and performing decontamination procedures.

Program I

[WMD Basic Agricultural Emergency Response Training](#) (PER-270)

Course Description

The WMD Basic Agricultural Emergency Response Training course is a 32-hour course that provides the responder with an overview of agro terrorism and Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, or Explosive (CBRNE) hazards, relative to their potential impact upon agricultural resources and the agricultural community. Lectures include response actions, epidemiology, zoonotic diseases, foreign animal diseases, animal restraint and euthanasia, and animal carcass disposal. Hands-on training provides knowledge and skills in selecting and using Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), conducting decontamination, using survey and monitoring equipment, and preserving the crime scene. The course culminates with a scenario-oriented, task-driven, hands-on practical exercise involving a response to a hazardous event in an agricultural setting.

Program J

[Managing Civil Actions in Threat Incidents \(MCATI\) Basic](#) (PER-200)

Course Description

The Managing Civil Actions in Threat Incidents (MCATI) Basic course is a 24-hour course that provides the responder with an overview of tactics of crowd control during a civil disorder or a Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, or Explosive (CBRNE) event. During the course, the responder will receive instruction on civil disorder, crowd control formations, and vehicle tactics to mitigate and control crowds. Additionally, the responder will learn the psychological influences of crowd mob behavior, protestor tactics, use of Riot Control Agents (RCA), and decontamination procedures necessary for

RCA. The responder will also receive instruction on mass arrests, transporting passive arrestees, use of protective shields during a civil event, the impact of legal considerations on civil disorders, the use of non lethal munitions, and the use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). The responder will be given the opportunity to train in crowd control and mock arrest scenarios and work with a Mobile Field Force (MFF) to demonstrate the tactics to safely resolve a mob situation.

Course Description

The Managing Civil Actions in Threat Incidents (MCATI) Command course is a 24-hour training course that prepares the management level responder to serve as a member of an incident management team during a civil action or disorder. The course provides instruction on incident management, incorporating preplanning considerations and other responsibilities of management level responders during such an event. The course also provides the responder with the ability to develop a local Incident Action Plan (IAP) for a civil action or disorder and implement response actions from the management level. The course culminates with the responder participating in a tabletop exercise that enables them to use knowledge and skills developed in the previous session to plan for and command resources at the incident site.

Program L

Course Description

The Managing Civil Actions in Threat Incidents (MCATI) Protester Devices course is a 24-hour training course that provides the responder with the ability to identify the purpose of protester devices; identify the various types of locking protester devices used in civil actions; discuss legal issues as they relate to the use of and the extrication of individuals from protester devices; outline the responsibilities of extrication team members; compare the roles and responsibilities of the extrication team with other law enforcement assets; demonstrate the safe operation of tools used to extricate an individual from protester devices; and demonstrate methods of extricating an individual from protester devices. At the conclusion of the course, the responder will demonstrate knowledge to manage civil actions in threat incidents relating to protester devices.

The WMD Respiratory Protection course is a 16-hour course that provides the responder with an overview of the history of respiratory protection; seminars on how to read, understand, and apply code of federal regulation standards relating to respiratory

protection; and hands-on practical exercises utilizing the responder's knowledge and skills in performing qualitative and quantitative fit testing with respiratory protection devices with the ability to interpret the test results. As part of the 16 contact hours for this course, the responder will learn how to develop, implement, and sustain an individual respiratory protection program for their department and/or jurisdiction.

Within each module of instruction, the responder is provided teaching techniques.

The WMD Law Enforcement Response Actions course is an 8-hour training course that provides the responder with hands-on training in surveying and monitoring, decontamination and triage procedures, use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), and scene survey and safety.

As part of the eight contact hours for this course, the responder will receive instruction on the laws, regulations, proper guidelines, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI)'s Crime Scene Search Protocol process that apply to crime scene management.

PER-201 Course Description

As part of their 24 contact hours for this course, the planning and management level responder will experience the outcome of the planning process as the beginning of an outbreak unfolds in a community.

PER-264 Course Description

The Law Enforcement Protective Measures (8-hour) course is an eight-hour course that provides the responder with seminars in the terrorist threat and indicators of terrorist activity, targets of terrorist activity and tactics used by terrorists, prevention and deterrence techniques, Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, or Explosive (CBRNE) hazards, protective measures, appropriate response actions, and the Incident Command System (ICS).

PER-265 Course Description

The WMD Law Enforcement Response Actions course is an 8-hour training course that provides the responder with hands-on training in surveying and monitoring, decontamination and triage procedures, use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), and scene survey and safety.

CDP 02-006 Course Description

The WMD Hands-On Training (8-hour) course is an eight-hour course that provides the responder with hands-on practical exercises that give the responder the ability to perform triage and decontamination procedures, classify residual contamination through the use of survey and monitoring equipment, and conduct scene survey and safety. As part of the eight contact hours for this course, the responder performs hazardous materials technician operations at a toxic agent training facility.

Program RR

[Healthcare Leadership \(B 960\)](#)

Course Description

A four-day, exercise-based training course, which provides a realistic setting to assist

healthcare professionals develop the appropriate decisions in response to a Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) event. Participants learn through the use of a functional, two-day exercise using the hospital. The exercise is supported by small-group instruction, discussions, and background presentations.

Program SS

[Hospital Emergency Response Training for Mass Casualty Incidents Train-the-Trainer \(B 461\)](#)

Course Description

A four-day course designed to provide guidance to hospitals, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), healthcare facility personnel and others who may become involved in a mass casualty incident as a result of a hazardous materials release or Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) event. The course expands on the Incident Management System (IMS) used within the hospital during emergencies, addresses Chemical Protective Clothing and Equipment (CPC&E) requirements, and presents guidance for Hospital Emergency Response Team (HERT) design, development and training. This course prepares a HERT to conduct a safe and effective emergency response during mass casualty incidents. This is a hands-on course using the hospital and a specially designed patient decontamination facility attached to the hospital.

Program TT

[Fundamentals of Healthcare Emergency Management \(B 965\)](#)

Course Description

A four-day course designed for personnel who are responsible for development, implementation, maintenance, and administration of emergency management plans for hospitals, clinics, community health centers, and other health care organizations. The course provides an overview of healthcare-oriented emergency management planning processes and stresses the need to coordinate these plans with local and regional emergency operations plans. Course topics include standards and regulations, hazard vulnerability analysis, incident command, training and exercises, facility infrastructure, resource management, personal protective equipment, surge planning, ethics, risk communications, continuity of operations, disaster recovery, financial planning and reimbursement, and evacuation planning.

Program UU

[Advanced Public Information Officers Course: Health and Hospital Emergencies \(B 966\)](#)

Course Description

A four-day modified version of Emergency Management Institute's popular Advanced Public Information Officers (E388) course designed to meet the needs of a health-related emergency. The goal of this course is to prepare Public Information Officers to make significant, positive contributions to their community's response to health-related

emergencies by providing credible information to the public. The concept of this course is for the participants to apply their knowledge and skills to an emergency situation. This is accomplished through instruction and a series of practical exercises. Course topics include legal issues, risk communication, interpersonal skills, conflict resolution, communicating during an emergency, media relations, use of the Joint Information Center (JIC), and stress management.

Program VV

[Incident Command System Train-the-Trainer \(ICS TtT\)](#)

Course Description

This course prepares participants to deliver EMI's ICS curricula. While ICS 100 and 200 courses are addressed, the major emphasis is on ICS 300 and 400.

Program WW

[Radiological Emergency Response Operations \(B 301\)](#)

Course Description

The Radiological Emergency Response Operations (RERO) course is a performance-based operations course in which the responders learn to respond to and manage radiological incidents. The responders, organized as response teams, operate and make decisions in a realistic exercise environment. This includes on scene incident assessment, radiological monitoring, radiation exposure and contamination control, accident victim rescue and care techniques, and reporting procedures. Because of the realism of the exercises, this course is physically challenging.

Program XX

Advanced Radiological Incident Operations (ARIO) (B302)

Course Description

The Advanced Radiological Incident Operations (ARIO) course is advanced level for individuals who need to refresh or improve their skills as a radiological responder or manager. This course focuses on response plans and procedures for complex incidents. The performance-based training concentrates on organization and jurisdictional issues and planning considerations where all levels of government may be involved in responding to an incident such as a terrorism event. This course is physically challenging.
