

2025 HURRICANE SEASON – MASS CARE OPERATIONS

COT DISTRIBUTION PLAN

I. PURPOSE

- A. Address planned preparedness actions by agency for distributing cots pre-storm to pre-identified shelters during the 2025 hurricane season.
- B. Provide baseline guidance for cot coordination operations.
- C. This concept of operations, (CONOP), will only be executed with the coordination of State partner assets.

II. PURPOSE

Distribution of approximately 4,000 cots to Evacuation Support Shelters in the coastal counties of the State pre-storm.

III. ASSUMPTIONS

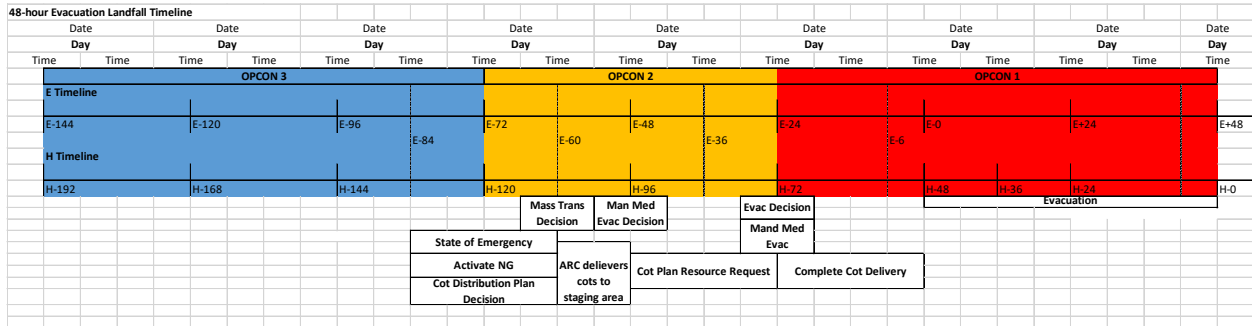
- A. Hurricane severity and track will determine the timeline for cot distribution from storage to the pre-identified Evacuation Support Shelters.
- B. Cots may be distributed to a local support shelter if an evacuation support is not in use, provided it is identified in a timely manner.

IV. SITUATION

- A. If the Governor of South Carolina orders an evacuation, pre-identified shelters must be immediately accessible and under the purview of government authority to open, operate, and close.
- B. There are 28 Evacuation Support Shelters in the State of South Carolina with a total capacity of 22,735 at 20 sq ft.
- C. The number of cots intended to go to each pre-identified Evacuation Support Shelter will be 10% of the maximum occupancy of that shelter. Any cots reserved for shelters that are not activated may be divided up to send to shelters with greatest need due to storm scenario as required.
 - 1. In the event of a full coastal evacuation with high compliance, a 17% planning factor was also considered.
- D. Several counties have accepted Mission Ready Packages containing cots from the American Red Cross. In the event of an evacuation, it is not assumed that the MRPs will fully cover the need for cots, so more cots may need to be delivered.

V. CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS

- A. Shelters to receive additional cots as part of this mission will be pre-identified as the situation dictates based on hazard and location.
- B. A list of pre-identified Evacuation Support Shelters will be issued by ESF-6 to the South Carolina National Guard, via resource request, between E-48 and E-24, in order to safely deliver the required cots before the onset of Tropical Storm force winds. The shelters on this list may change as the circumstances, hazards, impacts and timeline change.
 - 1. Shelters located in evacuation zones will not open if the zone is part of the evacuation order.
- C. The list of pre-identified shelters must include shelter name, address, number of cots being delivered to that shelter, and a point of contact for each shelter. The point of contact (POC) for each shelter is listed in the Shelter Facility Owner Pre-Survey Form.
- D. ESF-6 will submit one resource request with the pre-identified shelter list attached. Once the list of shelters planning to open is identified, county resource requests are not required for execution of this plan.
- E. The American Red Cross may request cots from one of their national Disaster Field Supply Centers to be staged at identified drop off locations in Ridgeland, Myrtle Beach, or Greenville.
 - 1. The Ridgeland drop off is located at 233 Grays Hwy, Ridgeland, SC 29936
 - 2. The Myrtle Beach drop off is 3531 Pampas Drive, Myrtle Beach, SC 29577
- F. The South Carolina National Guard will transport the cots from the drop off locations to pre-identified Evacuation Support Shelters in the counties across the northern, central, and southern hurricane regions pre-storm.
 - 1. The South Carolina National Guard will continually communicate the status of their operations with ESF-6 in order to provide an accurate estimated time of arrival for counties.
 - 2. If unable to make contact with POCs cots may be stacked by the front door, preferably under cover.
- G. The South Carolina National Guard will download the cots at the shelter sites. The shelter staff will be responsible for assembling the cots.
- H. The American Red Cross will collect cots post-storm.



VI. ORGANIZATION AND ASSIGNMENT OF RESPONSIBILITIES

A. General

Prior to the activation of this plan, agencies with cot distribution responsibilities will be coordinating resources and provide representation in the SEOC.

B. South Carolina Emergency Management Division (SCEMD)

1. Conducts mission analysis with supporting agencies to identify potential resource gaps.
2. Coordinates with other agencies as the hurricane evacuation timeline moves forward toward the need to open shelters. Share information that may assist with the cot distribution mission or shelter identification coordination.

C. South Carolina Department of Social Services (DSS)

1. DSS will support the Red Cross in the mission.
2. Coordinate with the Red Cross to identify Evacuation Support Shelters and points of contact per the local Emergency Manager in the event of an incident.
3. DSS, as the lead for ESF-6 will communicate status updates, ETAs, unmet needs, and points of contact as needed via the county conference calls held twice daily.
4. Assemble the cots along with the other shelter staff.

D. American Red Cross

1. Coordinate with DSS to identify Evacuation Support Shelters and points of contact per the local Emergency Manager in the event of an incident.

2. Coordinate with the South Carolina National Guard and DSS for collection of pre-determined shelters listing and number of cots to be distributed to each pre-identified shelter, for awareness of assets distributed and in need of pick up at closure of shelters. This will be verified by the attachment on the resource request.
 3. Assemble the cots along with the other shelter staff.
 4. Coordinate the pickup, cleaning, and reconstituting of the cots post-storm from shelter locations
- E. South Carolina National Guard (SCNG)
1. Conduct pickup of cots from storage at the Ridgeland and Myrtle Beach locations and transport to the designated Evacuation Support Shelters pre-storm.
 2. Provide ESF-6 with status updates throughout the mission.

VII. PLAN DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE

- A. SCEMD is the lead agency for the development, coordination, review and updating of this contingency plan.
- B. At a minimum, SCEMD will review and update this contingency plan on an annual basis. The review, maintenance and update will take into account any updates to the SCEOP, SC Hurricane Plan and SC Mass Care Strategy, in addition to, after-action reports (AAR) and other relevant State and Federal guidance.
